New Privacy Laws

The New Privacy Laws come into effect on 12 March. A draft copy of the College's new Privacy Policy will be posted on the College website next week for parents to access at their convenience.

Facts about Independent Schools

- Queensland independent schools educate almost 116,000 students at more than 200 campuses – 15% of all school students, and nearly 20% of secondary schools.
- Independent schools in Queensland receive 50% of their income from parents.
- Parents fund 80% of the cost of school buildings at independent schools Australia.
- The majority of Government funding from independent schools comes from the Australian Government – for state schools the majority of their funding comes from the State Government.
- On average, governments fund a non-state school \$8,744 compared with \$15,526 for a student in a state school (*Productivity Commission Report on Government Services 2013*)
- If non-state schools did not exist in Australia, governments would need to at least an additional \$8 billion annually on education.
- More than half (62%) of Queensland independent schools serve communities with average or lower income families.

Between March and June, all our students who completed Year Twelve last year can expect to receive instructions to complete a web-based survey or receive a telephone call from the Queensland Government Statistician's Office to complete the survey. 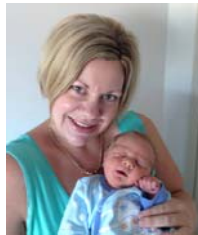

Griffith University Study - Episodic memory in full term children aged 7-9 years

We are conducting a study to assess the development of episodic memory (memory for personally experienced events) in children aged 7 to 9 years born full term (37 weeks or more) and with normal birth weight. The aim is to provide baseline data by which to evaluate episodic memory in children aged 7 to 9 years born very preterm or with very low birth weight.

Type of volunteers needed

We require children aged 7 to 9 years born full term (37 weeks or more) and with normal birth weight.

What would I be asked to do? How much time would it take?

Your child will be tested at Griffith University's Mount Gravatt Campus. Your child will be asked to complete one and a half hours of testing during which they will be assessed for general ability, impulse control, perspective-shifting and episodic memory. The tests are meant to be fun and take the form of games, including some computer games. You will also be requested to complete a brief questionnaire about your child's everyday memory abilities and family demographics.

The article below is a summary of the sermon referred to by Mrs Hockey in the last edition of Connections ('Parents Matter') Blessings from Pastor Jim and the Chaplaincy Team.

'Growing Faith in Our Children' by Rev Tim Robinson (Associate Minister of Logan Uniting Church)

Last fortnight, Logan Uniting Church ran its second 'Family Together Service'. It was great to see the church filled with children, young parents and proud grandparents. The theme for the service was 'Family Discipleship' and part of that focus was about helping children grow in their faith and Christian discipleship.

As parents, most of us really want our children to grow up to love and serve God and participate in the life and mission of the Church. Well, for those of us who are parents, I have some good news that is also a little daunting.

Parents are the single greatest influence on the faith of their children. What we live and model and practise at home has a greater influence on our children than anything else – more than church, more than Sunday School, more than Christian education, and more than youth group.

But don't take my word for it!

Vern Bengtson (Sociologist from the University of Southern California) undertook 35 years of research (1970 to 2005) examining the beliefs and practices of more than 3,500 grandparents, parents, children and grandchildren. He found that parental influence on their children's faith has not changed since 1970.

Parents matter!

It is what we model as parents, and the quality of our relationships with our children, that most impacts on their own discipleship. The research also indicated that grandparents, especially grandfathers, are the next greatest influence. The extended family has a very important role to play, too!

The organisation 'Search Institute' has been researching how to help children succeed for over fifty years. In a research study called Effective Christian Education, the Search Institute found that faith in the family context was the *most* important factor in faith maturity for children.

The study found that the particular family experiences most tied to greater faith maturity were:

1. Frequency of faith conversations (talking about spiritual issues)
2. Frequency of family devotions and prayer (around the dinner table or at bedtime)
3. Frequency of formal and informal serving of others as family

In other words, faith practised with the 'head, heart and hands! Implementing these faith-based activities is not always easy and it does not necessarily come naturally if you were not raised this way, but you can take small steps to introduce these practices. It is never too late to start!
