Calvary Christian College's community has always played a vital role in the overall College character. From the founding families to our newest families, their roles in our community have made, and will continue to make an impact on the Calvary story.

Five years before the school became a reality there was only one other Christian school in the area surrounding Springwood and Rochedale, which had a long waiting list and hefty price tag at the time.

A group of concerned parents from a few churches in the Logan area wanted an affordable Christian school to send their children to.

Speaking with one of our founding families, Mr Owen Bunker and his wife Jeanette, he stated "The founding families wanted a Christian based education and were determined to provide it for our children. The decision for the church was to make the school its ministry. The vision became a reality when a top educationalist, Dr John Roulston, joined the Uniting Church Synod and put his support and knowledge behind this decision."

"We wrote the constitution before we wrote the syllabus," said Mr Bunker.

The early mission of the College was to support parents with their God given responsibility as parents 'to bring their children up in the way of the Lord' and to carry on at school what was taught and nurtured at home. This too remains a priority for our current families.

Since its inception in 1984, the College and its 33 founding families took hold of the scripture from Proverbs 22:6 "Train up a child in the way he should go; Even when he is old he will not depart from it."

The Lord has truly blessed Calvary, from the early days of Logan Uniting Primary School to our present day in 2014. The role our community played in creating a loving and family atmosphere to the student body has stood the test of time.

In current research, Affordability and Christian Education are still some of the top factors as to why our parents choose Calvary for their children's education.

NAPLAN tests results

The College's 2013 NAPLAN results were pleasing with our students' achievement in the majority of cases now exceeding not only the Queensland but National averages as well. NAPLAN results improved overall in comparison to 2012 results. An analysis of the comparisons of NAPLAN results between cohorts in 2009, 2011 and 2013 indicate that, overall, our students improve their literacy and numeracy development over their schooling years. Students who may initially struggle with literacy and numeracy respond positively to the teaching and learning support provided by teachers.

According to a recent media release from Independent Schools Queensland, "While NAPLAN tests are a useful diagnostic tool for a school; they do not paint the complete picture of educational outcomes, personal development and experiences provided at school". Parents should remember that this type of exam does not take into account a student's talents in other areas such as creativity and social skills.

30th Anniversary history – how we came to acquire the land at Springwood

Part of the Calvary story was how the land was acquired at Springwood. This story is as much a part of the history of Logan Uniting Church as it is the College's. Parents from three little churches in Rochedale, Old Chatswood Road and Eight Mile Plains got together and had the vision for Christian Education and Aged Care. This vision of ministering from the cradle to the grave is still evident today.

The way the land came to be in existence was such a testimony of God's provision for our community in the early days. The founding families located 20 acres of land in the Daisy Hill area priced at \$200 000. They walked the property, prayed over it and decided to buy it. When they called the real estate agent, he said the land had been withdrawn from sale. However, he said that we have another parcel of land at Springwood but it is asking \$300 000. The families followed the same process of walking and praying over the land and they liked it. They called the real estate agent again. The real estate agent was very embarrassed as he said this parcel of land had also been withdrawn from sale. He then went on to say that he had land opposite to this second block of land for sale. It was more than 30 acres, with some low lying areas, but more than 20 acres of useable land. It was priced at \$110 000. Within two weeks the congregations from these three little churches, now Logan Uniting Church, bought the land at 161 Dennis Road, Springwood.

The rest they say is history!

Fun Fact: One of the original demountable buildings from 1984 is still being used today by the Play Groups who meet at Logan Uniting Church.

Before the firefighters came, we wrote some inquiry questions about the things we wanted to learn and made some predictions about what we thought the answers might be. Earlier in the week we had written what we knew about firefighters from our own experiences and from what we had read in books. When we returned to the room after their visit, we recorded what we had learnt.

What we knew before the visit:

- Firefighters wear helmets
- They have a really long ladder on their trucks
- They never work alone, but in a team
- Firefighters are very good at using water and foam to fight fires
- They are very strong

New information that we know:

- How to hold the hose and shoot water
- The big jaws help to get people out of car accidents
- Firefighters wear special uniforms so they don't get burnt by fire
- The hose squirts a long way to put out fires in high houses
- If you are on fire, "Stop, drop and roll"
- If there is a fire, "Get down low and go, go, go"
- "Get out and stay out!"
- Make a loud noise for the firefighters to hear you if there is a fire and don't hide from them
- If there is a fire, ring 000
- We must learn our address so that we can say where the fire is (I will need help with that one please parents)
- Fire trucks are red so we can see them; red is an emergency colour

Future changes to entry requirements for education bachelor degrees at QUT

From 2016 onwards, Bachelor of Education courses will have prerequisite subjects instead of assumed knowledge. This means students will need to have studied the required subjects to gain entry into these courses. The prerequisite subjects are: Senior English, Mathematics A, B or C and for students wishing to study primary and early childhood courses also a sound achievement in a Queensland Studies Authority science subject.

Students offered a place in these bachelor degrees in 2015 will not be able to defer commencement of their course.

New Doctor of Medicine program at the University of Queensland

UQ will introduce a new Doctor of Medicine (MD) program in 2015, enhancing global opportunities for its postgraduate medical students.

The four-year postgraduate-entry MD degree will replace the current four-year Bachelor of Medicine/Bachelor of Surgery (MBBS) program.

The MD program requires a minimum of a three-year bachelor degree for entry, with provisional and graduate entry to be offered to domestic and international students.

It's been a very busy start to the year and our Performance Music Program continues to grow. This year we have over three hundred students learning a musical instrument through our Music for Little Mozarts, String Along, Play Along and Tuition programs.

Performance ensembles are preparing music for upcoming performances and smaller groups or solos have provided entertainment for Principals' Tours on both campuses plus the new parent dinner.

Our first major performance for the year will be Christmas in July on Thursday 30 July commencing at 6.30pm. on the grass area near the Cunningham Auditorium at our Carbrook Campus. All our performance groups will be featured at this event. Early next term we will be starting group rehearsals for students in our String Along and Play Along Programs so they can have the opportunity to perform at Christmas in July.

All our instrumental music teachers are keen to see our young musicians enjoy their music opportunities. To enable them to enjoy the experience they need to progress otherwise they lose interest. Beginner students only need to do about 10 minutes four times per week to progress at a steady rate and naturally more advanced students need to do a little more.

The 'NO Sugar Challenge'

The Christian season of **Lent** is upon us. In other words, Easter is around the corner so we ought to prepare ourselves.

Not many members of our community would be familiar with the practice of Lent. Lent is a forty-day period of prayer and fasting starting on Ash Wednesday (5 March) and finishing on Easter Saturday. That commemorates Christ's fasting in the wilderness. Traditionally, Christians ate all the household sugar, butter, honey, jam and other sweets the day before Lent (Shrove Tuesday) and went without these treats until Easter Sunday. Some traditions still go without meat.

Even though I was not bought up with it, I believe in practising Lent each year for a number of reasons. The primary reason is that Jesus expected it of his disciples. The Bible records Jesus as saying "When you fast ..." not "if you fast" or "If you are in the mood for fasting". He said "when" and not "if" in accordance to the Jewish tradition which incorporated lots of prayer and fasting.

This year our staff has been invited to participate in a 'No Sugar Challenge'. Staff members have been encouraged to forgo some of their added sugar to a level of their choosing. Let me add that this is being done in a light-hearted manner and staff is enjoying the experience of the challenge.

Seriously, what is the 'God factor'?

What I have been reminded of at this end of Lent, is that "Lent is not really about Lent" in the same manner that "prayer and fasting is not really about prayer and fasting". Let me explain. The purpose of Lent is to help Christians to focus on the most important and significant event in history, use a dash the death and resurrection of God's only son, Jesus Christ. It is so easy to get caught up in traditions, losing weight and gaining health and fitness, (all good things in themselves) but these things can distract us from the spiritual purposes. In the same way, the techniques of prayer and fasting are not as important as communicating with God and getting closer to God. Something to think about perhaps?

Lastly, do not be surprised if your student's classroom teacher sends home a letter asking parents to review what they are putting in their children's lunch boxes. Lent is a great opportunity to clean up and clean out some bad habits.

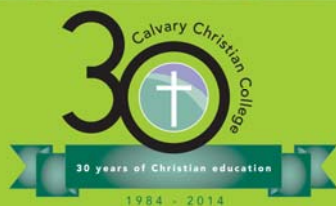
