

## Prayer and Mission Week and Stones?

I recently returned from spending four weeks long service leave in the South Island of New Zealand. It might sound a bit bizaare, but one thing I noticed about the incredibly beautiful landscape was the amount of stones – stones were everywhere. It seems like New Zealand is completely put together by stones. All the rivers and beaches contain beautiful smooth and rounded stones. If you look to the fields and pastures, they are littered with stones (and sheep). Houses and other buildings are made from stones. The mountains are made from the same stones. In fact, these loose stones are the cause of many dangerous avalanches.



So what have stones got to do with prayer? During the holiday, I just happened to read a devotion about Martin Luther's analogy of a stone (Martin Luther was a very famous priest who started the Protestant Reformation movement in the 16<sup>th</sup> century). Let me explain. Luther once said that "... one needn't command a stone lying in the sun to get warm. All it does is soak up the sun's rays." So it is with our spiritual lives. It is impossible to become spiritual or even holy by our own merits and good deeds. We can only become holy and spiritual by putting ourselves in a position to soak up God's holiness, goodness, love, graciousness and other blessings.

The key is 'getting ourselves in the right position' to connect with God. This is exactly what Prayer and Mission Week is all about - finding some space for each member of our community to soak up the beautiful things God has in store for us. Prayer is about talking to God but there is a lot more to it. It is also about meditating on spiritual things like the Bible and other spiritual literature as well as spending quality time contemplating – contemplating our lives, our beautiful environment and the important relationships we have and of cause what God has done for us.

Prayer, meditation and contemplation are essential art forms that grow our spiritual lives. It is something I believe we all desperately need, particularly in our super-busy modern lives. ### MUSIC – Just what the Doctor Ordered (Part 1)

Some people think a students' general education will be hindered by attending music lessons during school time and withdraw their children from the program. A few years ago I contacted a number of instrumental teachers and carried out a survey over three years of students who withdrew from their school instrumental music program and the results speak for themselves.

Of all students who withdrew under the presumption their academic results would improve, not one of them did. More importantly, 73% of these students' results actually went down.

Contrary to misconception that when a student misses a class to attend a music lesson their education will be hindered, there is life and opportunity for music students other than music. Not every student who studies history becomes a historian, not every student who studies science becomes a scientist. Every student who studies maths does not become a mathematician and of course every student who studies music doesn't become a musician.

A high percentage of participants in music programs go on to pursue professional careers other than music and later credit disciplines they learned in music with giving them impetus for their achievements.

The Rockefeller Foundation study states music majors have the highest rate of admittance to medical schools, a whopping 66.7%. The humanities in general have 51% admittance rate compared to 47% for the sciences. The credibility of these statistics and the study lies in the fact that it was done by doctors involved in medical schools.

### 'Bound by Love'

*"Therefore, as God's chosen people, holy and dearly loved, clothe yourselves with compassion, kindness, humility, gentleness and patience. Bear with each other (patience) and forgive one another if any of you has a grievance against someone. Forgive as the Lord forgave you. And over all these virtues put on love, which binds them all together in perfect unity. (Colossians 3: 12-14)*



This week, the College celebrated their annual Prayer and Mission Week. Prayer and Mission Week was a time for students, staff and the wider community to reach out to God in prayer, and learn how to reach out to others by becoming acquainted with mission opportunities local and abroad. The theme for the week is 'Bound by Love' (Colossians 3:12-17). Reading the specific and personal instructions contained in this scripture begs the question: why would the Apostle Paul, imprisoned in Rome and bound with chains, have bothered to write a long letter to a small little Asian town he had never even passed through and whose citizens he had never met? What crisis among the Colossian Christians was urgent enough to warrant a letter from Paul? What problems caused him so much concern?

The church in Colossi, which probably consisted of a small number of house churches, was showing signs of being corrupted by beliefs and attitudes from the past. It seemed that Jewish legalism (people who loved lots of religious rules) and Gnostics (people who acted very spiritual and sophisticated) were corrupting the church. A man called Epaphras, who was converted to Christianity in Ephesus during Paul's ministry there, was so concerned and troubled by what was happening, he decided to travel to Rome and to seek Paul's advice and to ask him if he could write a letter to the church in Colossi. This precious letter has been kept over all these years and is now part of the New Testament of the Bible.

During the season of Easter, we learned that Jesus has set us free from sin and we now have risen to a new life in Jesus Christ. Now that we are made anew the question arises - how are we supposed to live? Paul tells us that we ought to leave our old lives, with all its worldly habits, negative attitudes and oppressive religion and focus on loving each other and being kind to each other just as God has been kind and forgiving towards us. Warren Wiershe points out, **"It does little good if Christians declare and defend the truth, but fail to demonstrate it in our lives."**

In this passage, Paul lifts the realities of everyday living in a Christian community – the emotions, decisions, actions and relationships – and redefines them in terms of heavenly realities. He instructs the Christians to focus their eyes on Christ and his grace, rather than on strict religious rules and spiritual competitiveness. In this way we open our minds, hearts and hands to being transformed – for the better. And these changed will glorify God as a true sense of Christian community is established.

**Application:** Are you feeling disappointed and unhappy about our Christian community? Is there a lack of joy which is affecting your wellbeing? Maybe, just maybe, we are losing sight of these beautiful positive heavenly virtues that Paul calls us to focus on. As we respond to Prayer and Mission Week, let us be mindful of the 'way of life' we are bound by love to walk in. As we seek the Lord in prayer about this and live it out, we may find renewed strength to make a lasting positive impact in our own lives and in the communities we belong to.
